PLENARY SESSION I - Wednesday 3rd November 11.00-12.30

"SME Policy - Influencing Government: The Role of the Small Business Council"

The purpose of this plenary session is to offer some insights into the policy-research 'interface'. It aims to help researchers and practitioners to understand the ways of policy makers and to articulate current research needs within government with respect to entrepreneurship and SMEs.

The Small Business Council (SBC) provides a direct sounding board to the DTI with respect to their small business and entrepreneurship policies. It is not the only path that new knowledge takes into the minds of policy makers, but it is significant and 'has the ear' of the Secretary of State and the Prime Minister.

Four members of the Small Business Council form the panel for this plenary:

- William Sargent: Chair of the SBC and joint Chief Executive and Founder of Framestore-CFC, one of the world's leading creators of visual effects and computer animation for feature films, commercials and television drama. William will provide an overview of the SBC and its workings, including its linkages with policy sections of government and with the academic and practitioner communities.
- Professor David Storey: Director, CSME, Warwick Business School and an ISBA Fellow who has spent most of his academic career in small business research from an applied economic perspective.
- Caroline Hughes: Founder of ClickHere, a business services enterprise specialising in ICT training based in Teesside. Caroline is a relatively new member of the SBC and new to the working of government small business policy.
- Professor Monder Ram: Professor of Small Business, De Montfort University and a member
 of the ISBA Board. He joined the SBC in 2002. Monder will facilitate discussion between the
 other members by asking questions and also by taking questions from the audience.

PLENARY SESSION II - Thursday 4th November 14.00-15.30

"Entrepreneurship Education – creating the next generation of enterprises"

This Plenary Session asks whether the UK is at the cusp of a major change in the way it values and develops enterprise amongst young people. A major factor influencing the enterprise aspirations of the next generation in the UK is the education system; which incorporates the curriculum, the values and expertise of teachers and the embedding of enterprise practice in everyday learning at all levels.

Three key speakers address different aspects of entrepreneurship education in the Europe.

- Dr Kim Howells MP: Minister of State for Lifelong Learning, Further and Higher Education, has identified this subject as one of his priorities and he will emphasise the Government's desire to foster entrepreneurship among graduates and young people. He will present key policies and directions from the Department for Education and Skills with regards to building the capacity for enterprise in the UK.
- Professor Philippe Albert: CERAM Sophia-Antipolis and President of the Entrepreneurship, Innovation and Small Business network (EISB) at EFMD will present some results from a recent EFMD/EFER European-wide study on entrepreneurship education in universities. This provides a map of current practice and analysis of directions and needs with regards to entrepreneurship education at tertiary level.
- Professor Allan Gibb: Professor Emeritus, University of Durham, has spent much of his career developing innovative approaches to enterprise education in primary, secondary and tertiary education. He will present some of the challenges associated with the institutional changes required to embed enterprise in the education system at all levels.
- Professor Paul Hannon: Professor of Incubation & Enterprise, University of Central England and a member of the ISBA Board, will chair the session.

BEST PAPER AWARDS

The Board of ISBA believes that it is important to encourage and develop the quality and dissemination of research and good practice in the field of entrepreneurship and SME development. By awarding prizes to authors for good papers, ISBA is contributing to its mission to promote the advancement of public education by research into matters relating to small business and entrepreneurship and by the publication of the useful results of such research. This year we are offering a total of eight special awards thanks to the generous support of several Sponsors:


SPECIAL AWARDS CATEGORIES & VALUE

1 ISBA best academic paper - £500

The overall 'top' academic paper will be the one judged to most exemplify the general criteria opposite.

2 AWE (Accelerating Women's Enterprise) Award – best paper on women's enterprise – £500

The paper judged to have made the best contribution to understanding, enacting or supporting women's enterprise.



The paper judged to have made the best contribution to understanding or enacting entrepreneurship education



The paper judged to have made the best contribution to understanding or enacting the funding of enterprises and that its findings can be adopted in practice to improve funding for enterprise.

5 International Small Business Journal (ISBJ) Award for academic rigour – £500

The paper judged to have exemplary rigour in its approach to research or critical analysis. Papers nominated will be scrutinised by members of the ISBJ editorial board at ISBA and be eligible for publication in the ISBJ.

6 Small Business Service Award for best policy paper - £500

The paper judged to have made the best contribution to small business policy and that its findings can be adopted to improve small business policy.

7 Teesside Business School Award for best paper on Opportunity and Diversity - £500

The paper judged to have made the best contribution to understanding, enacting or supporting diversity and opportunity amongst enterprises in the UK. Areas will include: social enterprise, ethnic minority business and social inclusion.

8 Wood Holmes Group Award for best practitioner contribution – £500

The paper judged to best disseminate practice that improves conditions for, or specific developments of, SMEs or entrepreneurship.

BEST IN TRACK CERTIFICATES

In addition, the Leaders of each Track will nominate a 'Best in Track' award for what they jointly consider to be the best academic or best practice paper in their track. These will reflect the general criteria specified opposite as appropriate to the topic. Authors will receive a personally inscribed and signed Certificate for this award.















BEST PAPER AWARDS

ISBA Awards Criteria 2004

These general criteria apply to all prize-winning papers, in addition to the specific criteria:

- A focus on an issue relevant to understanding entrepreneurship or small scale enterprise including entrepreneurial behaviour, the firm's internal operation and its external links with the wider economy and community. Alternatively the paper may be on policy-making, its implementation or the activities of bodies which affect the performance of the small enterprise;
- An awareness of the relevant contexts including previous contributions to the research and policy literatures of the issues examined in the paper;
- An innovative approach to the topic selected, supported by a well designed, well executed research design or survey and/or a well informed and rigorous approach to policy formation and its application;
- A high quality, convincing analysis of the results of any research or study undertaken which clearly adds to the
 understanding of the functioning of the small scale enterprise and/or offers a new, well argued policy alternative with a
 clear potential to support the small enterprise;
- A well written, clear style with data presented in an attractive accessible form so that the paper demonstrates both the
 intellectual quality ISBA promotes as well as relevance for a wider audience including small business owners
 themselves.

Contributions to Practice

Practice showcases and papers describing 'best' practice should reflect the critical qualities above, but in particular should disseminate practice, i.e. they should:

- Clearly describe practice at a level of detail that assists dissemination and sharing;
- Articulate underlying concepts or principles that can be generalised and contribute to professional practice;
- Be grounded in actual practice and not merely in rhetorical or abstract reasoning;
- Include clear evidence of effectiveness in context.

Judging process

Track Leaders will nominate papers for each Award. They may nominate ONE paper for each special award, which will normally include their 'Best in Track' nomination. Track Leaders cannot nominate their own papers for Best in Track or the special awards.



Those delegates who arrive early can go on the popular City Sightseeing Bus that tours Newcastle Gateshead several times a day but only from April until October - so we have hired it privately, exclusively for our delegates and their partners.

Location: BALTIC, Riverside Restaurant, South Shore Road, Gateshead Quays.

Date & Time: Tuesday 2nd November 18.30 – 20.00. Shuttle buses will leave Jurys Inn every 10 to 15 minutes between 17.30 and 18.30. (The earlier buses will allow more time to look around the BALTIC art displays.)

Dress Code: Informal plus outdoor coat if you wish to walk back to the Hotels.

Gateshead Council will host this Welcome Reception at the Riverside Restaurant in BALTIC, Centre for Contemporary Art, with unique views of the guayside and the City.

Gateshead Quays is the historic heart of the town, a prosperous settlement in Roman times and a thriving industrial area during the Industrial Revolution and Victorian era. It fell into decline in the 1970's and is soon to be one of the largest cultural quarters of Europe.

Prior to the Reception delegates may walk freely around the displays of contemporary art, which close to the public at 19.00. During the Reception, the President of ISBA and the Leader of Gateshead Council will welcome delegates.

After the Reception delegates may like to walk across the iconic Gateshead Millennium Bridge and choose from a wide variety of restaurants, bars and clubs along the Quayside. It is about 20 minutes walk from BALTIC back to Jurys Inn - mostly uphill! Annual General Meeting

The ISBA AGM will be at 17.30 Wed 3rd Nov in Room 4 on the 1st floor of Jurys Inn. All current members and all full conference delegates are encouraged to attend, as there will be important resolutions to be considered on the future name and objectives of the Institute. Please look at Small Business Issues in Delegate pack.

Audio-Visual Presentation Testing

All Speakers should bring their PowerPoint files on a disc or CD to the Testing Station on the 1st floor of Jurys Inn well before their scheduled presentation. Each Workshop will be equipped with a data projector and a laptop computer so that speakers can insert their own discs. For those who do not use PowerPoint, overhead projectors can be made available subject to advance notice.

Business Centres

Jurys Inn has a Business Centre on the 1st Floor that can assist with photocopying, faxes, telephone messages and other office services on a chargeable basis.

Car parking

Shuttle Bus Services

Special Needs


Would delegates with special access, dietary or other needs please ensure that the Conference Secretariat have details so that every effort can be made to meet those needs during the event.








Two on Ground Floor - smoking
